Day 1~ KK - Transit City - Osaka 🔀

 Assemble at the airport. Take a flight to Osaka.

Day 2[~] OSAKA - Osaka Castle Park - Umeda Sky Building - Shinsaibashi (L/D) Hotel: Hotel Plaza Osaka / Similar

• Osaka Castle Park: Osaka Castle Park opened in 1931 and covers an area of 106.7 hectare. Osaka Castle Park is colorfully embellished. You can see about 600 cherry trees, including someiyoshino in Nishinomaru Garden. About 95 kinds of Japanese apricot flowers, 1250 trees in total bloom in Ume Grove, and in Omoide-no-mori (Grove of Remembrance), you can enjoy beautiful autumn colored leaves.



• Umeda Sky Building (Drive By): The Umeda Sky Building is a spectacular high rise building in the Kita district of Osaka, near Osaka and Umeda Stations. It is also known as the "New Umeda City". The 173 meter tall building consists of two towers that are connected with each other by the "Floating Garden Observatory" on the 39th floor. The observatory offers great views of the city through its windows and from its openair deck. In the basement, there is a restaurant floor that replicates a town of the early Showa Period, while offices occupy most other floors.



• Shinsaibashi (Shopping): The Shinsaibashi is the largest shopping area in Osaka where many boutiques and specialty shops are gathered, attracting local people and visitors. The Shisaibashi has developed from the arcaded streets "Shinsaibashi Shopping Street" which runs east to Mido-Suji Avenue, is the best-known shopping area in Osaka, and an enduring symbol of the city. With a history of 380 years, it was already an established shopping area in the Edo Period. Shops of all kinds and for all ages line the street, a roofed arcade 600 meters long.



Day 3[~] OSAKA - KYOTO - Fushimi Inari Shrine - Kiyomizu Temple - GIFU (B/L/D) Hotel: Hodakoso Sanga No Yu / Similar

- Fushimi Inari Shrine: Fushimi Inari Shrine (Fushimi Inari Taisha) is an important Shinto shrine in southern Kyoto. It is famous for its thousands of vermilion torii gates, which straddle a network of trails behind its main buildings. The trails lead into the wooded forest of the sacred Mount Inari, which stands at 233 meters and belongs to the shrine grounds.
- Kiyomizu Temple: Kiyomizuder (literally "Pure Water Temple") is one of the most celebrated temples of Japan. It was founded in 780 on the site of the Otowa Waterfall in the wooded hills east of Kyoto, and derives its name from the fall's pure waters. The temple was originally associated with the Hosso sect, one of the oldest schools within Japanese Buddhism, but formed its own Kita Hosso sect in 1965. In 1994, the temple was added to the list of UNESCO world heritage eiter.



Nishijin Textile Centre: The Nishijin Textile Centre is a perfect place to come both for those interested in textiles and willing to know more about this old tradition as well as for those who would like to shop for traditional Japanese souvenirs. The kimono has been associated with the image of Japan for centuries. Within Japan itself, Kyoto has been the main centre for kimono and textile production for more than 1000 years.



Day 4[~] GIFU - Shirakawa-go Village - TAKAYAMA - Kamisannomachi Street - HIDA (B/L/D)

Hotel: Hodakoso Sanga No Yu / Similar

 Shirakawa-go Village: It is a Japanese mountain settlement in what was once considered a wild and unexplored region. Because of the area's natural environment, with high mountains and heavy snowfall, interaction with neighboring regions was limited.



 Kami Sannomachi Street: Takayama's old town has been beautifully preserved with many buildings and whole streets of houses dating from the Edo Period (1600-1868), when the city thrived as a wealthy town of merchants.





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Day 5[~] HIDA - Kamikochi Highland (Kappabashi Bridge Area) - Wasabi Farm -

ISAWA(B/L/D) Hotel: Hanayagi No Sho Kaiji / Similar

- Kamikochi Highland (Kappabashi Bridge Area): Kappabashi is a suspension bridge over the Azusa River in the center of Kamikochi, not far from the bus terminal. Several hotels, restaurants, and souvenir shops can be found around the bridge.
- Wasabi Farm: The farm has been attractively developed for tourists with walking trails between the fields. Within the farm stands the Daio Shrine, which enshrines the spirit of an ancient local hero, Hachimen Daio, after which the farm has been named and who is considered the farm's protector. Nearby the shrine is also a small cave related to the local hero's legend.



Day 6~ ISAWA - Hitachi Kaihin Park -TOKYO - Aeon Mall (B/L/D) Hotel: Narita View Hotel / Similar

 Hitachi Kaihin Park: Hitachi Kaihin Park is a spacious park in Ibaraki Prefecture featuring a variety of green spaces and seasonal flowers spread out across 350 hectares, as well as an amusement park and several cycling and walking trails.



Aeon Mall (Free Shopping Time): AEON
 Mall Narita is 5 kilometers away from Narita Airport and takes 10 minutes via a direct
 bus ride from JR Keisei Narita Station. the
 mall is also recommended for people who
 want to further enhance their enjoyment
 of shopping and experiencing a variety of
 foods.



Day 7~ NARITA - TOKYO - Odaiba Mall -Asakusa Kannon Temple - Nakamise Street -Shinjuku (B/L/D)

Hotel: Kayabacho Pearl Hotel / Similar

• Odaiba Mall: Odaiba Mall is a popular shopping and entertainment district on a man made island in Tokyo Bay. It originated as a set of small man made fort islands (daiba literally means "fort"), which were built towards the end of the Edo Period to protect Tokyo against possible attacks from the sea and specifically in response to the gunboat diplomacy of Commodore Perry.



 Asakusa Kannon Temple: Asakusa Kannon Temple is a Buddhist temple located in Asakusa. It is one of Tokyo's most colorful and popular temples. The legend says that in the year 628, two brothers fished a statue of Kannon, the goddess of mercy, out of the Sumida River, and even though they put the statue back into the river, it always returned to them. Consequently, Sensoji was built nearby for the goddess of Kannon. The temple was completed in 645, making it Tokyo's oldest temple.



Nakamise Street: A shopping street
of over 200 meters, called Nakamise,
leads from the outer gate to the temple's second gate, the Hozomon.
Alongside typical Japanese souvenirs
such as yukata and folding fans, various traditional local snacks from
the Asakusa area are sold along the
Nakamise. The shopping street has a
history of several centuries.



Day 8~ TOKYO - Transit City - KK
